

THE SUNY-NANJING PILOT PROGRAM

Nanjing University (Nanjing) and the State University of New York (SUNY) agree that a formal educational relationship will serve the interests of the people of China and the United States. The goals of such a relationship were set out in a Memorandum of Understanding between SUNY and Nanjing, dated May 19, 2006. They also agree that such a relationship should involve a SUNY presence at Nanjing's international campus so that SUNY students and faculty may benefit from the educational and research opportunities at Nanjing. SUNY-Nanjing arrangements should foster a similar Nanjing student and faculty presence at SUNY campuses, allowing Nanjing students and faculty to benefit from the educational and research opportunities throughout the SUNY system. In addition, they agree that a goal of the initiative should be development of a curriculum unique to the SUNY-Nanjing initiative and the creation of a center for cooperative study, research, and social activities.

1. Nanjing and SUNY agree that development of their relationship should begin with a pilot program. The first iteration of this pilot program shall commence in August 2007 and end in May 2011. The second iteration of this pilot program shall commence in August 2008 and end in May 2012. While the pilot program is centered on SUNY-Stony Brook (Stony Brook), Nanjing and SUNY share the hope that development of the relationship will mean expanding the number of participating SUNY campuses.

2. Starting in 2007, Nanjing and Stony Brook will introduce newly admitted students at Nanjing to this unique SUNY-Nanjing dual degree, 4-year program, involving two years of study at Nanjing and two years of study at Stony Brook, leading to either a bachelor of science degree in biology or a bachelor of engineering degree in engineering science offered by the Department of Materials Science and Engineering. Alternatively, students may elect to enter one of Stony Brook's combined bachelor/master 5-year programs. Nanjing will identify 30 students from this group for participation in the program. The hope is that the students will be equally divided between the major subjects of biology and materials science. Such students shall be provisionally admitted by Stony Brook, provided that their grade point average is at least 3.0, they have scored at least 550 on the TOEFL (Test of English as a Foreign Language), and completed all curricula requirements of the pilot program. Under such circumstances, Stony Brook shall formally admit them for study in the United States. ✓

3. Nanjing and Stony Brook shall assist the students and faculty in this pilot program in obtaining necessary visas.


4. The Nanjing students shall pay the prevailing out-of-state tuition fee (U.S.\$10,600 per year in 2007) and such other fees for services for which Stony Brook students pay (approximately U.S.\$11,400 per year in 2007). Payments shall be made by the students directly to Stony Brook. SUNY will use its best efforts to try to assist Nanjing students in finding sources, including work-study, to help pay tuition and fees.

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
5. Stony Brook shall be responsible for providing residence hall space and such services normally provided to Stony Brook students.
6. A SUNY-Nanjing Implementation Working Group shall oversee operation of the SUNY-Nanjing initiative and will provide a forum in the first instance for addressing and resolving issues that may arise in connection with the initiative.
7. Nanjing students shall obey all SUNY and Stony Brook policies and U.S. and New York laws and regulations during their stay in the United States. Violation of any such policies, laws, or regulations shall be cause for termination from this program without refund of tuition.
8. Upon finishing studies at Stony Brook, the Nanjing students shall return to China.
9. SUNY faculty identified by Stony Brook shall offer four SUNY General Education courses at Nanjing. Nanjing agrees to pay transportation and living costs for Stony Brook faculty going to Nanjing to teach in this initiative.
10. Nanjing may send faculty members associated with this pilot program to Stony Brook. Nanjing shall pay their salaries. Such faculty will participate in instructional activities at Stony Brook. Stony Brook shall bear the local lodging costs for such Nanjing faculty.
11. After six months, SUNY and Nanjing shall evaluate the program and enter into additional agreements if necessary to advance the relationship. Discussions concerning these additional aspects and terms of the program shall continue in good faith during the pilot phase using the SUNY-Nanjing Implementation Working Group. At such time as any additional agreement is entered into, Nanjing shall provide SUNY with assurances that all necessary Chinese government approvals have been received or in process of being granted.
12. Stony Brook, on behalf of SUNY and its students, shall coordinate SUNY study abroad programs for students wishing to study at Nanjing. Nanjing University will facilitate this process.
13. Management of the international programs in this agreement (pilot and study abroad) is the responsibility of the Office of the Deputy Dean of the Nanjing International College and the Dean of International Academic Programs at Stony Brook. Oversight is the responsibility of the Office of the Vice President for Research and International Collaborations at Nanjing, and the Office of the Provost and Executive Vice President for Academic Affairs at Stony Brook.
14. A Stony Brook-Nanjing Implementation Working Group shall develop remaining details of the pilot program.
15. SUNY and Nanjing shall collaborate amicably to address any issues that may arise.




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
