

MEMORANDUM OF UNDERSTANDING
between
STATE UNIVERSITY OF NEW YORK AT STONY BROOK
STONY BROOK, UNITED STATES OF AMERICA
and
HANGZHOU NORMAL UNIVERSITY
HANGZHOU, CHINA

In accordance with Section II of the Memorandum of Understanding between the State University of New York at Stony Brook, United States of America, hereafter "SBU", and Hangzhou Normal University, China, hereafter "HZNU", this Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) is entered into by and between the two institutions, hereafter "Parties".

1. Purpose

The Parties recognize the benefits to be derived from increased collaboration, cooperation and interaction for the further promotion and understanding of health services and management.

The purpose of this MOU is to define the areas of fundamental academic research in which the Parties desire to work together in the future for their mutual benefit to create the Joint Hangzhou Normal-Stony Brook Global Health Center (GHC) with a view to benefiting from each other's initiatives and working procedures and to support collaboration among the researchers associated with both Parties.

2. Scope

This MOU sets forth the intentions of the Parties for increased collaboration, cooperation and interaction and does not create any legally binding commitments. If the Parties later agree to undertake specific joint projects with legally binding obligations, they will develop separate written agreements for such projects, setting out each Party's contributions, deliverables, and budgets.

Parties intend to establish GHC to pursue collaboration on fundamental academic research related to health services and management with a focus on the following components:

2.1 Population health services

2.1.1 To collaborate on research that explores social/behavioral determinants of health, and modifiable factors that contribute to health promotion and disease prevention including health restoration/rehabilitation and the testing of new technologies that can support the health/wellness continuum.

2.1.2 To conduct research on gerontology with a "life course epidemiology" approach to looking at trends in population health across the life-course.

- 2.1.3 To explore new technology research regarding public health monitoring and emergencies.
- 2.1.4 To collaborate on public health surveys, and the collection and implementation of big data.

2.2 Health services industry

- 2.2.1 To focus on the clinical transformation and promotion of new health services technologies, as well as exchange and cooperation in the areas of medical services, community services, health tourism, beauty and health care services, health food, and fitness products.
- 2.2.2 To explore health care for people of different ages including disease prevention mechanisms and new technology research.

2.3 Public health

2.3.1 Global health

- To actively exchange views with regard to regional and international health issues, both within and outside the field.
- To explore and collaborate on research between group vs. individual preventative measures.
- To conduct research on comparative analysis of public health and health care systems, in different social and policy settings, and countries.

2.3.2 *Healthy City*: to discuss Healthy City construction and development of public policies, strategies and assessment measures.

2.3.3 Health service management: jointly discuss how to integrate health concepts, theories and practices into all relevant policy research in the field of public administration.

3. Responsibilities

- 3.1 Parties plan to assemble an administrative committee or working group that will define achievable goals and topics that encourage collaboration and cooperation of projects.
- 3.2 Parties plan to raise funds by submitting proposals to foundations and private industries to perpetuate the operation. Any funding agreements with legally binding obligations will be set forth in separately written agreements.
- 3.3 Parties offer a faculty exchange opportunity with the aim of sharing and furthering the scientific and technical know-how of both Parties.
- 3.4 Parties plan to hold annual or bi-annual conferences on scientific research.
- 3.5 Parties are encouraged to jointly publish academic papers in national and international journals.

4. General Provisions

- 4.1 All activities developed under the auspices of this MOU will comply with the procedures, policies, and practices of each Party as well as all applicable laws and regulations including applicable portions of the U.S. Export Control Act and, with regard to HZNU, applicable laws in China.
- 4.2 Treatment of intellectual property rights developed through collaborations under this MOU will be determined between the Parties, in accordance with intellectual property policy of both institutions, through mutual consultation and separate written agreements on a case-by-case basis.
- 4.3 Parties acknowledge that the visit by faculty, staff and students from one institution to the other shall be subject to the entry and visa regulations of the United States of America and China, and shall comply with the regulations and policies of SBU and HZNU.

5. Duration/Termination

- 5.1 This MOU is established for a period of five years, effective on the date of signing.
- 5.2 In order to enhance the efficacy of their cooperative activities, SBU and HZNU agree that it shall be possible to introduce changes and additions to the MOU only by means of mutually agreed-upon additional written clauses signed by the parties.
- 5.3 At the end of each five-year period, this MOU will be automatically renewed by mutual agreement for an additional five years, unless SBU or HZNU provide written notification of a decision of non-renewal prior to the expiration date. A minimum period of six months notice will be required from either party wishing to terminate the MOU. In the event of termination, any commitments to students participating in the program will be honored by relevant parties.






